# **Description**

The ADS9227EVM is a platform for evaluating the performance of the ADS9227. The ADS9227 is a 2-channel, 16-bit resolution, 5-MSPS per channel successive approximation register (SAR) analog-to-digital converters (ADC). An integrated ADC driver simplifies external signal-chain that can be optimized for low-power and high-precision.



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## 1 Evaluation Module Overview

### 1.1 Introduction

This user's guide describes the characteristics, operation, and use of the ADS9227 evaluation module (EVM). This is an evaluation platform for the ADS9227 device. The EVM eases the evaluation of the ADS9227 with hardware, software, and computer connectivity through the universal serial bus (USB) interface. This user's guide includes complete circuit descriptions, schematic diagrams, and a bill of materials (BOM). Throughout this document, the terms *evaluation module and EVM* are synonymous with the ADS9227EVM.

#### 1.2 Kit Contents

The ADS9227EVM includes a standard FMC connector on the bottom of the PCB. The FMC connector can be used to mate with standard FPGA kits, including the TSWDC155EVM (sold separately). The TSWDC155EVM is a digital controller board that is necessary for the included EVM software GUI to communicate with the device, graph measured results, and compute common figures of merit (for example, SNR and THD).




Figure 1-1. System Using GUI and TSWDC155EVM




Figure 1-2. ADS9227EVM Block Diagram

The block diagram in Figure 1-2 depicts the connections and basic subsystems of the ADS9227EVM.

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#### 1.4 Device Information

The ADS9227 is a 16-bit, 5-MSPS per channel, dual-channel, simultaneous-sampling, analog-to-digital converter (ADC). The ADS9227 integrates an ADC driver, precision voltage reference, reference buffer, and common-mode voltage output buffer. Combined with low conversion latency, high sampling rates, minimal AC and DC errors, and low temperature drift, the ADS9227 is a high-performance design for applications requiring both precision and speed.

The serial LVDS (SLVDS) digital interface reduces board layout complexities, relaxes FPGA timing closures, simplifies firmware, and supports full throughput at lower clock speeds.

#### 2 Hardware

# 2.1 Analog Interface

This section details the analog input connections to the ADS9227EVM.

# 2.1.1 ADC Channel Inputs

Each ADC channel in the ADS9227 features an integrated, high-speed ADC driver amplifier. This internal driver circuit is specifically designed to charge the internal sample-and-hold capacitor in each ADC channel such that the sampled voltage is fully settled during the minimum acquisition period. In addition, the driver amplifiers present a high input impedance to the external signal chain. This allows systems engineers to design an analog input circuit that meets the requirements of the application without also being concerned with performance degradation due to charge-kickback during sampling.

The ADS9227EVM presents two unique signal chain proposals for the user to evaluate: a high-bandwidth, fully-differential circuit that supports input frequencies up to 1MHz and a low-bandwidth, high-CMRR circuit with programmable gain that supports input frequencies up to 300kHz. Either circuit can be used to drive ADC A and ADC B since the channels are identical by design in the ADS9227.

# 2.1.1.1 High-bandwidth, Fully-Differential Circuit: THS4551




Figure 2-1. THS4551 Fully-Differential Circuit for ADC A

Figure 2-1 shows the schematic for the THS4551 input circuit connected to ADC A. The THS4551 is a precision, low-noise, fully differential amplifier with a gain-bandwidth product of 150MHz. This circuit is configured for a gain of 1V/V and can accept both single-ended and differential inputs. Install R3 and R4 as needed to support signal sources with  $50-\Omega$  output impedance.




Figure 2-2. OPA320 Circuit to Buffer the ADS9227 VCMOUT Voltage

The output common-mode voltage on the THS4551 is set by the voltage connected to the VOCM pin. When used with the ADS9227, TI recommends to buffer the VCMOUT voltage of the ADC before connecting to the VOCM pin of the THS4551. This makes sure that both amplifier outputs stay within the expected ADC input common-mode voltage range. The OPA320, shown in Figure 2-2, is used as the VCMOUT buffer to drive the output common-mode voltage on both ADC A and ADC B input circuits.

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# 2.1.1.2 Precision, High-CMRR Circuit: PGA855




Figure 2-3. PGA855, High-CMRR Circuit for ADC B

Figure 2-3 shows the schematic for the PGA855 input circuit connected to ADC B. The PGA855 is a high-bandwidth programmable gain instrumentation amplifier with fully differential outputs. This circuit is designed for input signal frequencies up to approximately 300kHz. The gain of the PGA855 is set by the combination of three binary gain pins, which are configured using the corresponding jumpers on the EVM (see Table 2-1).

The PGA855 uses separate supply voltages for the input stage and the output stage. The input stage supply rails (VS+ and VS-) can range up to ±18 V and must be provided externally. Connect the VS+ and VS- supply voltages and a ground wire from an external power source to the J3 terminal block on the EVM. The output stage supply rails (LVDD and LVSS) are shared with the ADS9227 analog supplies (AVDD\_5V and GND). This is done intentionally to limit the output swing of the PGA855 and to protect the ADS9227 inputs from overdrive.

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## 2.1.2 Voltage Reference

The ADS9227 uses an internal 4.096V reference voltage, which can be measured on the REFIO pin when configured as an output (default). For applications which require improved drift performance, configure the REFIO pin as an input and apply an external reference voltage to the pin.

The ADS9227EVM include a provision for evaluating the REF7040 reference IC. The REF70xx family of high precision series voltage references offers the industry's lowest noise (0.23ppm<sub>p-p</sub>), very low temperature drift coefficient (2ppm/°C), and high accuracy (±0.025%). In addition, these precision reference devices feature high PSRR, low drop-out voltage and excellent load and line regulation to help meet strict transient requirements. The REF7040 on the EVM is the 4.096V output voltage option. To connect the REF7040 to the ADS9227, configure the REFIO pin as an input via the GUI and then install a shunt on jumper JP2 in the [1-2] position.




Figure 2-4. External Reference Voltage Using REF7040

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## 2.2 Power Supplies

By default, the TSWDC155EVM provides the ADS9227EVM with a 3.3V supply ("3P3V"). The ADS9227EVM has a TPS61033 boost converter which increases the 3.3V supply to 5.5V. The 5.5V supply is applied to the input of two independent low-dropout regulators (LDOs) to derive the required analog and digital supplies for the ADS9227 when JP11 is in the [1-2] position. U5 (TPS7A2050) outputs 5V, which is used for the AVDD\_5V supply. U6 (TPS7A2018) outputs 1.8V, which is shared between the AVDD\_1V8 and DVDD\_1V8 supplies.

The LDO input voltage (LDO\_IN) can be changed to an external source ranging from 5.2V to 5.5V by configuring the shunt on JP11 in the [2-3] position and connecting the external supply to terminal block J9. In this setup, U7 (LM66100) provides reverse polarity protection in the event that the connection is wired incorrectly.

The PGA855 operates over a wide single-supply range of 8V to 36V or dual-supply range of ±4V to ±18V. The positive and negative supply rails for the PGA855 (VS+ and VS-) must be provided from an external bench supply and connected to terminal block J3 on the ADS9227EVM.




Figure 2-5. Power Entry and On-Board Regulators

Figure 2-5 shows the power tree schematic for the ADS9227EVM.

### 2.2.1 USB Power and When to Power the Board Externally

As discussed in Section 2.4, the USB-C connector is able to provide power to the TSWDC155EVM and ADS9227EVM using the default configuration. The combined peak current consumption reaches 600 mA (typical) during the ADC conversion process and 520 mA RMS (typical) after the ADS9227EVM is initialized in the GUI, as described in Section 3.1.3.

The TWDC155EVM is a high-power SuperSpeed (USB 3.0) device. This means a PC supplies up to 900 mA from a compliant USB 3.0 port. However, many PC USB port configurations allow much less than this limit depending on the unit load handshake process, usually resulting from other devices on the bus. Tripping the current limit on a USB can result in cutting power to the USB port, excessive power dissipation or heating, depending on the PC port configuration. As a result, TI highly recommends to consider switching to an externally powered ADS9227EVM and/or TSWDC155EVM if:

- Only USB 1.0 or USB 2.0 ports are available.
- There are multiple devices connected to the PC by USB at the same time.
- The USB 3.0 port configuration for the PC is unknown.

To switch to the external power configuration on the ADS9227EVM, move the jumper on J18 to the EXT\_PWR position and use the J17 terminal block to provide the required 5.2-V to 5.5-V supply. To switch to the external power configuration on TSWDC155EVM, move the jumper on J2 to the 5 V (external) position and use the J10 terminal block or barrel jack connector to provide the required 5-V supply.

USB hubs can cause possible device enumeration issues and are not recommended when communicating through the TSWDC155EVM.

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# 2.3 Digital Interface and Clock Inputs

This section details the digital interface connections and clocking options for the ADS9227EVM.

## 2.3.1 Digital Interface Connections




Figure 2-6. Digital I/O

The ADS9227 uses both SPI and LVDS type interfaces. The SPI is a CMOS interface that is used to configure the internal device registers and consists of SCLK, SDI, SDO,  $\overline{CS}$ , and SPI\_EN. For data capture, the ADS9227 uses a source-synchronous LVDS interface. Data for each channel are output on a dedicated differential signal pair (DOUTP/M\_A and DOUTP/M\_B). In addition, the device outputs both a differential frame clock (FCLKP/M) and data clock (DCLKP/M) back to the host with the conversion data. This type of interface makes sure that propagation delays are consistent between the data output, frame clock, and data clock, improving timing closures at the host. Both the SPI and LVDS interface signals connect to the FMC connector on the EVM. Figure 2-6 provides the FMC connector signal definition. These signals are also available via test points for scope measurements as indicated in PCB silkscreen.

The FMC connector pinout below can also be interfaced with standard FPGA development kits. Note that the TI-provided software GUI is only compatible with the TSWDC155EVM and third-party software development is not supported.

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#### 2.3.2 Clock Select




Figure 2-7. Sample Clock Selection

The ADS9227EVM offers the following options for providing the conversion clock to the ADS9227: a CMOS clock from the TSWDC155EVM, a CMOS clock from an external source, and an LVDS clock from external source. Table 2-2 and Figure 2-7 provide an overview of the ADS9227 sample clock options available on the EVM. By default, the FPGA controller on the TSWDC155EVM (sold separately) sources a single-ended CMOS clock that can be connected directly to the SMPL\_CLKP pin on the ADS9227 by configuring JP6 in the [2-3] position. Connect SMPL\_CLKM to GND by installing a shunt on JP7. Lastly, install a jumper on JP5 in the [2-3] position to provide a SMPL\_SYNC input from the FPGA controller, which is used to synchronize the internal averaging filter on the ADS9227 at the start of data capture. This default configuration allows the user to select the clock frequency from the options listed in the EVM GUI.

When using an external CMOS clock, move JP6 into the [1-2] position, install a shunt on JP4, and connect the external clock source to the SMA connect, J6. To use an LVDS clock, remove the jumper from JP4 and install a  $100\Omega$  resistor on the footprint for R26. Make sure that any external clock source has low jitter to maximize the performance of the ADS9227.

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## 2.4 ADS9227EVM Quick Start Guide

The following instructions are a step-by-step guide to connecting the ADS9227EVM to the computer and evaluating the performance of the ADS9227.




Figure 2-8. Connecting the Hardware

- 1. Review the default jumper settings in Figure 2-8 below as well as the power guidelines in Section 2.2.1.
- 2. Physically connect J1 of the TSWDC155EVM to J27 of the ADS9227EVM. This component is the digital communications and power signal connection in default configuration.
- 3. Set jumper J18 to the FMC\_PWR position so the TSWDC155EVM provides power. Otherwise, set J18 to EXT\_PWR and connect an external 5.2-V to 5.5-V supply on screw terminal connection J17.
- 4. Bypass any external USB hub and connect the USB on the TSWDC155EVM directly to the computer.

- 1. Install the GUI as described in Section 3.1.1.
- 2. Install the necessary USB drivers as described in Section 3.1.2.
- 3. Launch the GUI.
- 4. Press the *Initialize USB*, *Power Up*, *Program FPGA*, and *Initialize ADS92xx* buttons, in order from top to bottom, on the *Config* tab to power up and configure the EVM, (see Section 3.1.3 for details).
- 5. Connect a 10 V<sub>PP</sub>, single-ended sine wave signal from a function generator to any AINxP SMA input connector.
- 6. Press the EN SYNC button on the Capture tab.
- 7. Select the number of samples to be at least 32k points, and choose the Hanning window type for best frequency domain results.
- 8. Press the *Start Capture* button to collect and analyze the data displayed on the appropriate CHx tab; see Figure 3-6.



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## 3 Software

### 3.1 ADS9227EVM Software Reference

#### 3.1.1 ADS9227EVM-GUI Software Installation




Figure 3-1. Software Installation - Part 1

This section details the installation and operation of the ADS9227EVM software graphical user interfaces (GUI). These software require the TSWDC155EVM (sold separately) controller to operate. The first step to installing the software (as shown in Figure 3-1) is to download the latest version of the EVM GUI installer as per Table 3-1.

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


Figure 3-2. Software Installation - Part 2

Accept all the license agreements and choose the destination location, project directory, and start menu. Typically, the default values work, but these values can be customized as needed based on the user's requirements. Next, the installer prompts the user to create a desktop icon and summarize the installation plan. Clicking *Install* begins copying software onto the computer. This process takes a few minutes. At completion, the user can launch a readme text file and the application. Figure 3-1 and Figure 3-2 show these steps.

#### Note

The GUI installer and GUI buttons can differ slightly depending on which specific GUI is being installed.

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#### 3.1.2 USB Driver Installation

This section describes the steps for installing the USB driver.

- 1. For the TSWDC155EVM, connect J8 to the workstation using a USB-C to USB-A cable.
- 2. Bypass any USB hub and connect directly to the computer.




Figure 3-3. Open Device Manager




Figure 3-4. Update Driver With Device Manager

- 3. Open the Windows® Device Manager, as shown in Figure 3-3, and right-click on the *WestBridge* folder in the Device Manager window and select the *Update Driver* button (see Figure 3-4).
- 4. In the next window that appears, select *Browse my computer for driver software*.
- 5. Then select Let me pick from a list of available drivers on my computer in the next pop-up window.
- 6. Click on *Have Disk* in the pop-up window and navigate to:
  - a. C:\Program Files\Texas Instruments\ADS92xx\bin\proj lib\Sparrow\Bootloader

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# 3.1.3 Using the CONFIG Tab




Figure 3-5. Initial Required Setup on the Config Tab

After the EVM GUI starts, press the following buttons in the order shown in Figure 3-5 below. Confirm that each step is completed before proceeding by monitoring the Status message. For the Power Up and Program FPGA buttons, some status LEDs on the hardware illuminate. After all four buttons are pressed, the power on the ADS9227EVM is on and the ADS9227 device registers are configured.

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## 3.1.4 Using the Capture Tab




Figure 3-6. Initial Required Setup on the Capture Tab

In Figure 3-6, shows an example data capture display. In this step, the necessary updates to the *Capture* settings are made to capture the time domain data and to get a good frequency domain result. First, update the number of samples to at least 32k to get good frequency domain results (for example, accurate FFT display, SNR data, and THD data). Finally, select the Hanning type window to eliminate spectral leakage in the FFT result.

When these changes are made, press the *Start Capture* button to collect time domain and frequency domain data. Select the appropriate tab to view data for channel 1 or channel 2.

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# 3.1.5 Using the INL/DNL Tool




Figure 3-7. Using the INL/DNL Tool

The INL/DNL tool measures the linearity of the of the ADS9227EVM by applying a full-scale, low-distortion sinusoidal input signal. The accuracy improves if the number of hits per code is increased at the cost of extra test time. Select the channel to measure and the hits per code. An input signal greater than full-scale is required to verify that all ADC codes are tested. An input signal of +0.1 dBFS is sufficient. Then press the GET INL/DNL button to run this tool as shown in Figure 3-7.

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## 3.1.6 Using the Histogram Tab




Figure 3-8. Using the Histogram Tab

The Histogram tool represents the distribution of ADC output codes for a given sample set. The accuracy of the statistical summary can be improved by increasing *hits per code*, which increases the sample size at the cost of extra test time. Select the channel to measure and configure the *hits per code*, *channel*, *resolution*, and enter the reference voltage value. Then, press the *GET HISTOGRAM* button as shown in Figure 3-8.

The cumulative effect of noise coupling to the ADC output comes from sources such as the input drive circuits, the reference drive circuit, the ADC power supply, and the ADC. The total noise is reflected in the standard deviation of the ADC output code histogram that is obtained by performing multiple conversions of a DC input applied to a given channel. Selecting the correct reference voltage gives the result in units of voltage instead of codes.

Note that any data collected the histogram tab is not saved or stored on the *Capture Tab*. As a result, switching between the tabs results in lost data. Saving data on this screen does not provide the raw ADC codes but instead saves the histogram data presented on this tab in codes per bin. To save the raw ADC output values, use the *Capture* tab.




Figure 4-1. ADS9227 Device Connections Schematic







Figure 4-2. Input Connections








Figure 4-3. Power Connections and Regulators Schematic



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


Figure 4-4. Digital Connector Schematic




Figure 4-5. Top Overlay




Figure 4-7. GND Layer




Figure 4-6. Top Layer





Figure 4-8. Power Layer








Figure 4-9. Bottom Layer




Figure 4-10. Bottom Overlay
